				needs). More information on PPE use can be found here. As is usual practice, in an emergency, we will call 999 if someone is seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk. Anyone with coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms will be advised not to visit the GP, pharmacy, urgent care centre or a hospital. Any members of staff who have helped someone with symptoms and any pupils who have been in close contact with them do not need to go home to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms themselves (in which case, they will be asked to arrange a test) or if the symptomatic person subsequently tests positive or they have been requested to do so by NHS Test and Trace. Everyone must wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running water or use hand sanitiser after any contact with someone who is unwell. The area around the person with symptoms must be cleaned with normal household bleach after they have left to reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people. 



Based on the advice from the health protection team, close contacts who have symptoms will be advised to take a PCR Test, a task which will not be undertaken by HNS Test and Trace. We would ask pupils and staff who are awaiting the results of PCR tests to wear face coverings and take extra precautions until the results are known.


Household members of those contacts who are sent home do not need to self-isolate themselves unless the child, young person or staff member who is selfisolating subsequently develops symptoms.

Pupils who are shielding or self-isolating

All other pupils must attend school. We will bear in mind the potential concerns of pupils, parents and households who may be reluctant or anxious about returning and will put the right support in place to address this. This may include pupils who have themselves been shielding previously but have been advised that this is no longer necessary, those living in households where someone is clinically vulnerable, or those concerned about the comparatively increased risk from coronavirus (COVID-19), including those from Black, Asian and
