

## 5c. British Values Policy

The Lyceum School meets the requirements of Independent schools as set out in Part 2 of Schedule 1 to the Education (Independent School Standards) (England) Regulations 2010. Through SMSC provision, we actively promote British Values. The government defines British Values as: **democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths** and **beliefs**.

The Lyceum School ensures that principles are actively promoted which:

- Enable pupils to develop their self-knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence
- Enable pupils to distinguish right from wrong and to respect the civil and criminal law of England
- Encourage pupils to accept responsibility for their behaviour, show initiative and understand how they can contribute positively to the lives of those living and working in the locality in which the school is situated and to society more widely
- Enable pupils to acquire a broad general knowledge of and respect for public institutions and services in England
- Further tolerance and harmony between different cultural traditions by enabling pupils to acquire an appreciation of and respect for their own and other cultures
- Encourage respect for other people, paying particular regard to the protected characteristics set out in the Equality Act 2010
- Encourage respect for democracy and support for participation in the democratic processes, including respect for the basis on which the law is made and applied in England
